#### **Homelessness Consultation**

A consultation was carried out in October 2018 as part of the Arun Homelessness Review.

Consultation questions were posed via an online survey and circulated to internal and external partners and stakeholders working in Arun, inviting participation.

Partners included public sector agencies such as Sussex Police, Probation and relevant services within West Sussex County Council and Ford prison. The consultation was also circulated to homelessness organisations, charities and service providers including Stonepillow, Turning Tides (formerly Worthing Churches Homeless Project), Bognor Housing Trust, Sanctuary Housing and Home Group as well as housing associations operating within Arun.

Senior managers, Group Heads and relevant frontline staff within Arun were also invited to participate in the consultation.

# 20.2 Consultation Responses:

38 responses were received, from a wide range of partners, stakeholders and colleagues. Respondents provided ideas and specialist opinions. The questionnaire responses were as follows:

	These included the following main categories:					
	<ul> <li>22 replies: more social &amp; affordable housing, including within new housing schemes</li> <li>8 replies: rent caps</li> <li>5 replies: increase Local Housing Allowance payments</li> <li>5 replies: landlord incentives &amp; engagement</li> <li>4 replies: ongoing tenancy support, including money advice</li> <li>4 replies: increase shared housing / single person housing</li> <li>3 replies: use of Discretionary Housing Payments</li> <li>3 replies: shared ownership / Help to Buy / self-build</li> <li>Specific ideas included:</li> <li>'a forum for younger people'</li> <li>'take over empty properties to renovate and rent out at reasonable rents'</li> <li>'increase the number of affordable homes when granting planning to developers'</li> </ul>

Q4 Partners' contributions to end rough sleeping...

35 respondents provided comments.

These included the following main categories:

8 replies: increase hostel spaces 7 replies: easy access to support 7 replies: drug & alcohol support

6 replies: multi-agency, County-wide approach, including shared funding bids

5 replies: mental health support 5 replies: money & debt advice 4 replies: Housing First model

4 replies: supported housing provided by charities, with sufficient funding

## Specific ideas included:

'Ask rough sleepers & explore their reasons for homelessness'

'Sharing professional workers eg. Housing options officer advice at a food bank or mental health worker therapy sessions at temporary accommodation'

'More creative ways to house people who have enduring mental health and addiction issues'

Q5 Helping those on low incomes into private rent...

33 respondents provided comments.

These included the following main categories:

17 replies: incentives /engagement with landlords to accept Bonds & tenants on benefits

8 replies: rent deposit bonds

6 replies: dedicated roles to liaise with landlords

6 replies: money & debt advice 5 replies: tenancy support

4 replies: affordable private sector rents

### Specific ideas included:

'Take more robust action with roque landlords'

'Floating support to enable those who are struggling to gain support prior to problems arising'

'Look into low season holiday rentals as short term lets'

Q6 Incentivising private landlords...

35 respondents provided comments.

These included the following main categories:





8 replies: liaison officer for landlords to resolve problems

7 replies: tenancy sustainment support

6 replies: guaranteed rent scheme (including when property is empty)

## Specific ideas included:

'Landlords will take people on benefits if they have a known person they trust who is overseeing the placement'

'Free EPC, gas safety and electrical checks'

'Tenancy training sessions that landlords recognise'

Q8 Types of support...

37 respondents provided comments.

These included the following main categories:

15 replies: tenancy support

10 replies: money and debt advice 9 replies: proactive, early intervention

### Specific ideas included:

'More sympathetic reaction to those who contact the Housing department'

'Joint home visits with landlords'

'Make drop-in support in places people visit regularly such as GP surgeries'

Q9 Safe & healthy housing...

32 respondents provided comments.

These included the following main categories:

10 replies: local policing or wardens

7 replies: community events / resident involvement

#### Specific ideas included:

'Invite neighbourhoods to get together through organised events'

'Work collaboratively to target cuckooing'

'Regular hubs for people to get advice'

24 respondents provided comments.

These included the following main categories:

5 replies: partnership working / understand the views of other agencies

4 replies: increased funding

# Specific ideas included:

'Create an eyes-wide-open approach'

'Have honest conversations about the models of service needed and how these could be funded'

'Focus on peripatetic services that go to where people regularly frequent'

'Across the south coast Arun are the leaders in being proactive and responsive to homelessness'
