CHANGING PLACES TOILETS EXPRESSION OF INTEREST

Authority is sought to support the submission of an Expression of Interest (EoI) to help fund four Changing Places Toilets in the district. Motion about Southern Water

We are unfortunately hearing about the continuous discharges of untreated sewage in the sea which has directly affected our residents' opportunity to use the bathing waters, as well as affecting the wildlife in our harbours and waterways.

This is not just an issue for the Arun District either, it is affecting the coastline from Kent to Portsmouth. Residents along the coast are being constantly subjected to incidents where raw sewage is simply pumped directly into the sea.

Arun District Council believes that the health of residents is of the utmost importance, and this situation therefore must not be allowed to continue. It will also potentially affect our local economy if people are unable to use the seaside because of unsafe bathing water.

This Council urges Arun District Council to condemn this disgraceful practice in the strongest possible terms and calls upon Southern Water and Mr Andrew Griffith, MP and The Rt Hon Nick Gibb, MP to meet together with Arun District Council to agree specific timed commitments for ceasing the practice of discharging untreated sewage into our safe water system.

This Council notes with great concern that Southern Water has been fined £90m for sustained sewage discharges into seawater and water courses in our region, after earlier repeated offences. It also notes that Macquarie, a company with a history of asset stripping and profit taking, have taken a majority stake in the company.

It RESOLVES to request the Chief Executive and Group Head of Planning write to them asking what plans and timescales they have to:

- a) Cease such illegal discharges causing risk to public and environmental health
- b) Separate rainwater drainage from sewage networks
- c) Accommodate all the proposed new house building with main sewer connection before a) and

If no satisfactory answers are received, it further RESOLVES to request the DCHLG to drastically reduce the Arun Local Plan housing delivery targets until safe sewage disposal and reasonable rainwater excess drainage can be achieved.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Authority is sought to support the submission of an Expression of Interest (EoI) to help fund four Changing Places Toilets in the district. Changing Places Toilets are larger accessible toilets for severely disabled people, with equipment such as hoists, privacy screens, adult-sized changing benches, peninsula toilets and space for carers.

Proposed locations are Regis Centre car park, Bognor Regis, Wildfowl and Wetland Centre, Arundel, Hotham Park, Bognor Regis and Coastguard toilets, Littlehampton.

This report is submitted as an urgent item as there was insufficient time to prepare the expression of interest, and the accompanying report in advance of the normal publication date. The report cannot go to a later Committee meeting date because the submission deadline for the expression of interest is 26 September 2021.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1. Endorse the submission of the Expression of Interest for funding of four additional Changing Places Toilets within the district.
- In the event the Council is successful in obtaining government funding for Changing Places Toilets, that authority is delegated to the Group Head of Technical Services to accept the grant.
- 3. In the event the Council is successful in obtaining government funding for Changing Places Toilets, that authority is delegated to the Group Head of Technical Services, in consultation with the Chair of the Environment & Neighbourhoods Committee, to submit any necessary planning applications.
- 4. Approve a virement of up to £117k (if all 4 bids are successful) from the capital

programme for toilet refurbishment for match funding of the bid.

- 5. Recommend to the Corporate Policy and Performance Committee that, in the event that government funding is awarded for Changing Places Toilets:
 - that the capital programme for toilet refurbishments is increased by up to £117k (depending on the amount of match funding required for the Changing Places Bid) to allow the existing programme to be delivered in 2022/23.
 - An additional £4,200 per toilet is included within the revenue budget (for a maximum of three toilets).

1. BACKGROUND:

Local Authorities can apply for a share of a £30m fund to install life-enhancing Changing Places Toilets (CPTs) in public places and tourist attractions, providing a significant increase in areas where users want them most.

There are currently around 1,200 registered Changing Places Toilets in England – these are larger accessible toilets for people who cannot use standard accessible toilets, with equipment such as hoists, curtains, adult-sized changing benches, and space for carers. Over 250,000 people in the country need these facilities to enable them to get out and about and enjoy the day-to-day activities many of us take for granted.

Research conducted by the Research Institute for Disabled Consumers, showed the top three locations where these facilities should be made available were country parks, open spaces, and tourist attractions. The top three venues were: beaches and the seaside, motorway services, and parks or gardens.

Proposed locations for CPTs in Arun District:

Government has made a notional 90K-100K funding allocation for Arun District Council to be bid for.

Based on the stakeholder feedback and deliverability we propose to put forward an Expression of Interest (EoI) with the following sites within it. They are listed in order of priority and include the proposed delivery year:

- Regis Centre car park (demountable and relocatable structure behind the existing toilet block) 22/23
- Wildfowl & Wetland Centre, Arundel (within existing building) 21/22
- Hotham Park (demountable structure) 22/23
- Coastguard toilets, Littlehampton (within the existing block as part of refurbishment works). 23/24

The Wildfowl & Wetlands Centre are to partner with the council and provide a location within the centre. They will also manage and maintain the facility.

The Wave includes CPTs which our leisure services operator is making available to the public and will be placing these facilities on the national CPT website shortly.

Timescales:

The EoI deadline for submission is 26th September 2021.

Successful local authorities should expect to receive initial grant funding in Autumn 2021, subject to Ministerial approval. Works to be carried out from 2021-2024.

- 5. Recommend to the Corporate Policy and Performance Committee that, in the event that government funding is awarded for Changing Places Toilets:
 - a. that the capital programme for toilet refurbishments is increased by up to £117k (depending on the amount of match funding required for the Changing Places Bid) to allow the existing programme to be delivered in 2022/23.
 - b. An additional £4,200 per toilet is included within the revenue budget (for a maximum of three toilets).

6. IMPLICATIONS:

Financial Implications:

If successful, £40,000 per unit is grant funded. Other than the Wildfowl & Wetland Trust site, each of the other locations is likely to need Arun District Council to provide in the region of £35,000-£40,000 capital per site match funding. There is no provision currently in the approved Capital Programme for this. In order to avoid growth, it is considered prudent to switch capital resourcing from the existing toilet refurbishment capital budget for the purpose of providing the Changing Places Toilets. If the bid is successful, it will be necessary to include growth in the programme for this. Assuming confirmation of funding is received in autumn 2021, the capital programme proposals could be adjusted to include this in the expected year.

Annual maintenance/cleaning costs are expected to be in the region of £4,200 per annum per site (excluding the Wildfowl & Wetland Trust site). This would be an additional cost to current maintenance and cleaning costs so would have to be shown as budget growth if the Council's bid succeeds.

Members will be aware that capital and revenue funding is restricted and there is a possibility that not all growth bids can be supported in setting the Council's budget.

Legal:

Agreement will be required for the Wildfowl and Wetlands Trust to set out the terms and conditions of the grant if successful.

Equality Impact Assessment:

The installation of CPTs would have a positive impact on disabled people and support Arun District Councils Equality Policy 2014.

Asset Management/ Property/ Land:

Property Estates and Facilities Manager has been consulted and assisted in the

identification of appropriate locations. The team will be responsible for project management of these CPT installations and the ongoing maintenance.

7. REASON FOR THE DECISION:

The contribute to the Council' commitment of creating an inclusive environment. The Equality and Diversity Policy 2014 sets out how the council support the Equality Act 2010 CPTs are an example of a "reasonable adjustment". Arun have produced a Changing Places Toilets Guidance document that also highlights the Council's commitment to being inclusive and welcoming. The installation of more CPTs in the district will make the area more accessible to severely disabled people, including those with profound and multiple learning disabilities. Everyone should be able to access public toilet facilities that meet their needs and enjoy public spaces.

EOI Overview

The Ministry for Housing, Communities and Local Government is inviting local authorities in England to complete this Expression of Interest form by **26 September 2021** to receive capital funding to install Changing Places toilets.

The following tiers of local government are eligible to apply for funding:

- District Councils
- Unitary Authorities (single tier)
- London Boroughs
- Metropolitan Boroughs

All details relating to this Expression of Interest can be found in the Changing Places prospectus published on 29 July 2021.

Final allocations will be determined through the initial supply/demand measure as set out in the allocation methodology in the prospectus. The weighting for this indicative allocation is 40%.

The following three factors contained in this Expression of Interest make up the remaining 60%, and along with the allocation methodology, will be used to assess the value for money of each authority's proposals:

- 1. The number of new Changing Places toilets that will be produced for the funding amount requested (25%)
- 2. The amount of co-funding from the local authority and partners. (10%)
- 3. Quality of the proposal, including (25%):
 - Types of proposed CPT locations/venues/facilities
 - Rationale for these decisions
 - Consultation with users
 - Deliverability

Local authorities may submit one EOI only. The EOI should be signed by a named officer with appropriate authority and be approved by the Section 151 Officer to confirm the proposals are deliverable and that ongoing revenue costs of maintaining and cleaning facilities have been identified and committed.







We want to make Arun as accessible as possible to everyone. Arun District Council is encouraging **Changing Places Toilets in all appropriate destinations** and developments as they transform experiences for many residents, visitors and their families. **Councillor John Charles Portfolio Holder for Planning**

Background

It is important that people with profound, complex and multiple disabilities and impairments are able to safely, comfortably and hygienically spend time away from their home. Changing Places Toilets (CPTs) support this by providing sanitary facilities, with extra



space and equipment, that can be used by people who require the assistance of one or two carers/companions. As they are designed for assisted use they should supplement, not replace, standard unisex accessible toilets. They are not appropriate for bariatric use¹ and are not baby changing facilities.

What is a Changing Places Toilet?

CPTs have a floor area of at least 3x4 metres with a ceiling height of 2.4 metres and provide a range of features including:

- Tracking hoist covering the whole room
- Adult changing bench which is adjustable and easy to clean
- Toilet with drop down support rails and 1m clearance each side (from centre of pan)
- (Optional) adjustable shower (hose to reach centre of bench)
- Adjustable height sink
- Privacy curtain/screen
- Alarm pull cords and reset button
- Comfortable temperature for undressing
- Welcoming and interesting decoration with visual contrast to highlight equipment, door frames and door handles

The room structure, track, hoist and changing bench should operate at a safe working load of 200kg

For the full specifications of a CPT see <u>Changing Places</u> and British Standard <u>BS 8300-2:2018</u>. If you do not have access to the British Standard please see the example layout at Appendix 1. These features are in addition to requirements in <u>Part M of the Building Regulations</u>.

In some cases facilities that don't meet all of the minimum specifications in the British Standards can be registered as a CPT but you should bear in mind that these cannot be used by as many people.

What are the benefits of a CPT?

CPTs enable people with profound, complex and multiple disabilities and impairments, and their families to access every day places and stay away from home for longer.

Changing Places Toilets make the difference between visiting somewhere for a couple of hours and being able to stay for a day or until the end of an event. Emily Hudson, parent²

CPTs can also help providers by demonstrating a clear commitment to being inclusive and welcoming, enhancing public safety, attracting the "purple pound" and as an example of a "reasonable adjustment" under the Equality Act 2010.

Where should CPTs be provided?

Many types of places may be able to accommodate a CPT. They are most needed in every day locations where people pass through or spend time. Locally adapted from BS 8300-2:2018³, Arun District Council is seeking the inclusion of a CPT in largescale public developments such as:

- a. major transport terminals and interchanges, e.g. large railway stations and airports
- b. roadside service stations
- c. sport and leisure facilities, including large hotels
- d. cultural centres, e.g. museums, concert halls, art galleries and faith centres
- e. stadiums and large auditoriums
- f. large commercial retail premises and shopping centres
- g. key buildings within town centres, e.g. town halls, civic centres and main public libraries
- h. educational establishments
- i. health facilities, such as hospitals, health centres and community practices
- j. other visitor attractions such as theme parks, monitored beaches and parks.

How do I install and manage a CPT?

The CPT Consortium sets out <u>advice for installation</u>. In addition to Building Regulations consent, you may also require planning permission and/or listed building consent to install a CPT; Arun District Council offers a checking service if you are unsure.

Careful consideration should be given to the location of your CPT in relation to disabled persons' parking, co-location with other visitor facilities and the avoidance of physical barriers, e.g. uneven surfacing, steep slopes and multiple doors. Locating a CPT before any ticket barriers will maximise the number of people who can benefit from the facility.

The appropriate management arrangements will depend on the location, opening hours and likely usage of your CPT. Typically access is freely available within public buildings and visitor complexes where there is surveillance by staff, or via a more managed <u>locking system</u> appropriate to the level of security risk where CPTs are in less observed locations.

As with all public toilets, CPTs should be regularly monitored and cleaned to ensure they are kept to a good standard. Venue staff should be familiar with the CTP but are not expected to help visitors use the facilities as assistance will be provided by carers/ companions.

How much will a CPT cost?

Installation costs will vary depending on the specifications of the equipment being installed and whether the CPT is being installed in an existing building, will form a new extension or is being designed into a new building.

As a guide, adapting a suitably sized room to a full CPT will cost from around £15,000. There are lots of variables with new builds; our advice is that you look at installing a CPT as early as possible in the design process so that it can be factored into the space, building schedule and budget. It is worth checking whether you are eligible for <u>funding</u>.


Publicise and celebrate your CPT!

CPT providers tell us they take pride in their facilities. Make the most of your CPT by following these tips:

- Display <u>CPT signage</u> plus clear signs for other toilet / baby changing facilities so that people use the most appropriate facilities
- Register your facility on the <u>CPT website</u> with accurate details such as opening times, precise location and whether a key or coins are needed
- Tell your customers by updating your website and social media, host a media launch and have fun with the CPT selfie kit
- Let Arun District Council know by emailing us using the address on the back page

Key

- 1 Paper towel dispenser
- 2 Full length mirror
- Large sanitary disposal bin, if possible 3 recessed into the wall
- 4 Alarm reset button
- 5 Full room cover tracked hoist system
- 6 Vertical grab rail
- 7 Drop-down support rails with toilet paper dispensers
- Flat-topped close-coupled cistern providing 8 a back rest and a colostomy bag changing surface for standing users^(a)
- 9 Peninsular WC (see Figure 45 for the location of associated fittings)
- **10** Large power-assisted height-adjustable washbasin

- **11** Waste disposal bin
- 12 Manually-operated low-noise hand dryer (see Note 2 to 18.5.6.1)
- 13 Retractable privacy curtain/screen
- **14** Alarm pull cord
- **15** Height-adjustable showering/changing bench, min. 1800mm long
- 16 Floor drain
- **17** Optional shower unit with hose long enough to reach the centre of the bench, for personal hygiene purposes
- **18** Wide paper roll dispenser for use on the changing bench
- 19 Sanitary towel dispenser
- **20** Two clothes hooks, one at 1050mm and the other at 1400mm above the floor

NOTE 1 Details of common features of sanitary accommodation are described in 18.1 and accessories related to toilets in 18.5.6. Advice on particular products is available from the Changing Places Consortium (see Commentary on 18.6). NOTE 2 Provision of a wash/dry type WC can enable greater independence and dignity for users.

NOTE 3 Provision of a shelf can be beneficial for users.

Where high or low level or reduced flush cisterns are used, a rail with a padded back rest and a separate colostomy bag. (a)
